Hybrid Teas

Hybrid teas are repeat, classically formed bloomers borne singly on long stems. They're great for perennial beds or mass planting.

Floribundas

Smaller and more compact than hybrid teas, floribundas bloom on shorter stems throughout the season as singles or in clusters. Most floribundas grow well in containers.

A combination of a hybrid tea and floribunda, grandifloras are larger plants with elegant blooms on long stems, which may appear in clusters.
